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1 I made the statement."

I maid, "Well, that is too bad you did, but whatever you did is your business, I guess."

so, anyway, later on that afternoon it was commissary s time again, and we got in line, and I had just started a talking to Catherine O'Connor, and she started talking the same thing over again, "Why don't you get in touch with s them?" and this and that and the other, and "it wouldn't hurt to talk to them," and all that stuff. And just as I answered her, Joan Martin passed by me, just as I answered Catherine O'Connor, "Oh, I don't feel that I could be a rat for anybody."

Well, Joan Martin caught the word "rat," and that was all, and she thought that I called her a rat, and started a big argument there in the corridor, and we almost got in 16 a big fight. And the matrons pushed all the girls back in 17 the corridors, and they put me in solitary.

So Mildred Curtis came by the cell, and she said, "You are a darn fool for standing for this. Why don't you send a note down to one of Dawey's men that, on account of his witnesses, you were put in solitary confinement?"

So I was pretty burned up about it myself, and I said, "Yes, I am going to do that." So that was the first note I sent down. I wrote something about, "On account of one of your lousy witnesses, I have been put in solitary confinement, and I don't think it is fair."

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So later I found out that that was what they wanted. I imagine that was what they had been working for, was that first note. I didn't know at the time that they couldn't have talked to me if I hadn't sent that first note down, and now I think it was all framed up to get me to send that first note down, to get me down there to talk to him.

Anyway, he had an excuse to ask for me, that a prisoner had sent for him.

Q Just before you get to that -- in any of these conversations that you had with any of the women witnesses or with Mildred Curtis, was the name Charlie Lucky or Charles Luciano mentioned at all?

A Yes, with Mildred Curtis.

Q What did she say about that?

A Well, I asked her what she had testified in front 16 If of the Grand Jury, and she told me what she had testified, that she had been in a restaurant with Charlie and Tommy Bull and David Betillo, and that she had heard Charlie say, "Well, did you carry out that order?" and that Tommy answered, "Yes. The madem is in the hospital now." And I looked at her and I said, "Did you say that?" And she said, "Yes." And I said, "How did you come to be in their company?" She said, "Well, I was Tommy's girl." And I said, "You were Tommy's girl?" I said, "I know

a lot of his girls, but I never knew you were his girl."
